Furthermore, KMTC is involved in a range of community engage-

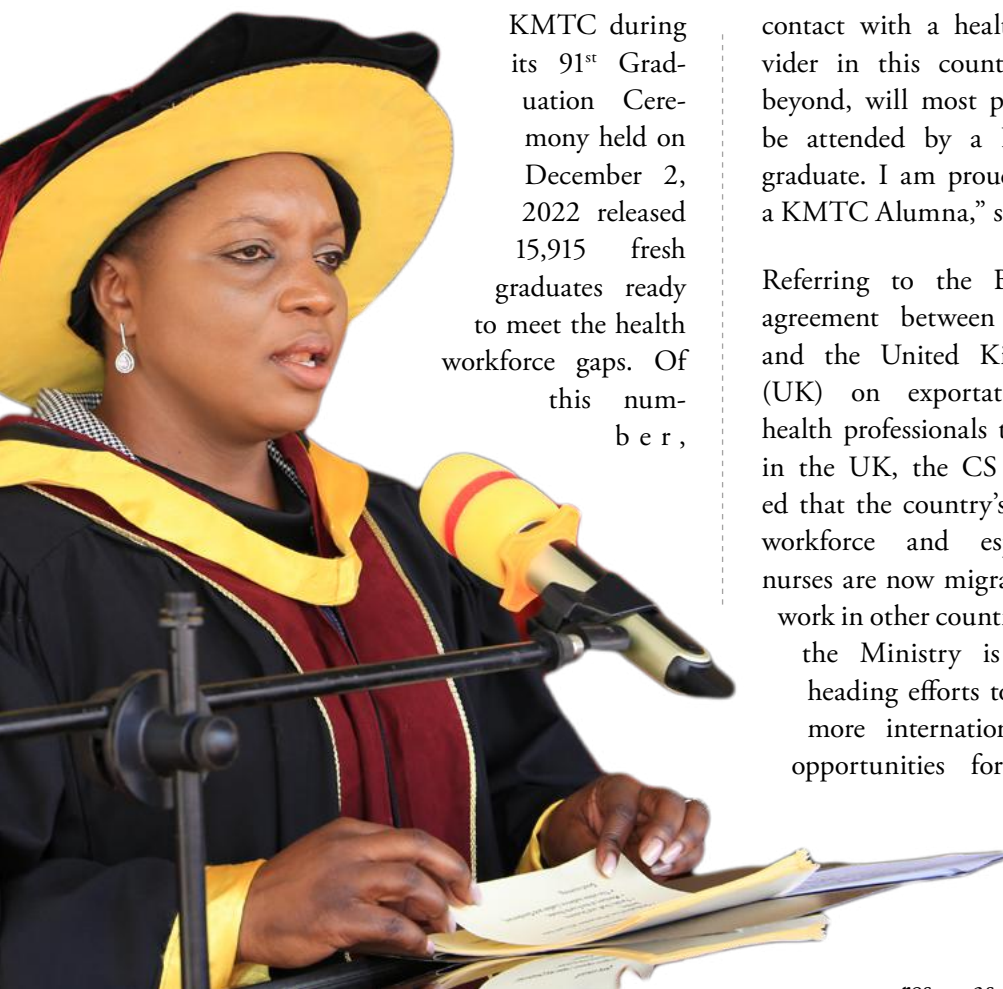

KMTC HOLDS 91ST GRADUATION CEREMONY, RELEASES 15,915 MEDICS INTO THE HEALTH SECTOR



KMTC during its 91st Graduation Ceremony held on December 2, 2022 released 15,915 fresh graduates ready to meet the health workforce gaps. Of this number,

In addition, the 2022 graduation comes against the backdrop of the recent equating of the College’s Higher National Diploma Qualifications to University Bachelor’s Degrees.

Referencing this milestone, KMTC Board Chairperson Amb. Zachary Muburi-Muita reported that “Our quest to continually supply a quality global health workforce recently received a boost after certification by the Kenya National Qualification Authority (KNQA).”

692 were awarded Higher Diplomas, 8,235 Diplomas, and 6,988 Certificates.

The event which was presided over by Ministry of Health Cabinet Secretary Ms. Nakhumicha S. Wafula, saw the highest-ever number of graduates in the history of the College given the power to put their training to work.

Giving her remarks, the CS observed that KMTC has been making great strides in the field of healthcare service delivery, “Anyone making

cadres as well. “KMTC thus has to be intentional in creating training opportunities responsive to both local and global market needs,” she stated.

Ms. Wafula further outlined that the Ministry of Health is harmonizing and implementing several policy reforms and programs in the health sector. These include the Universal Health Coverage (UHC) and Health Insurance subsidy programs for the poor and vulnerable households. “The revision of the UHC benefit package will allow Kenyans covered

Amb. Muita affirmed that the equation could not have come at a better time as the KMTC graduates are ever linked to training and career opportunities both in and outside the country.

On the same note, the Chairperson stated that “to demonstrate that the College is indeed the preferred health training institution nationally, on a yearly basis, we receive over 30,000 applications and continue to train students admitted to universities but who chose to pursue KMTC programs, even as we seek to expand our capacity to train as well for other regional countries.” Adding, “During clinical placement and community engagement, the over 50,000 students in session work closely with the rural and urban populations, therefore, improving the health outcomes of the country.”

To increase access to training opportunities for all, Amb. Muita announced that the College had joined hands with the Higher Education and Loans Board (HELB) to launch an education fund for

KMTC students. “So far, the National Treasury has approved a figure of Kshs 680 million funding towards this scheme, of which, Kshs 226.6 million has already been disbursed as part of the allocation,” he added.

The College’s Chief Executive Officer Dr. Kelly Oluoch conveyed that the decision to hold a virtual graduation, with minimal physical participation, had been informed by the threat posed by the Ebola outbreak and reports of a renewed upsurge in Covid-19 cases, and subsequently for the safety and dignity of KMTC students, graduates, their families, staff, and the general public.

He confirmed that “in line with this year’s theme of Sustainable and Comprehensive Training towards a Responsive Health System, the Graduands are well trained, examined, equipped with a diversity of skills and competencies to serve in any part of the world.”

In addition, Dr. Oluoch disclosed that “in order to take care of our increasing and aging population,

strengthen Primary Health Care and how communities can access health services, the College has collaborated with partners to offer training for Specialized Cadres, Community Health Volunteers, Community Health Assistants, Community Health Extension Workers, Life Support as well as Emergency Medical Technicians.”

Having been started in 1927 with four students at the Kenya School of Administration, the College has a current student population of 54,000 students undertaking 93 courses in 72 KMTC Campuses spread out in 44 out of the 47 Counties. The College currently produces 85 percent of middle-level healthcare workers in the country and will be celebrating its 95th anniversary in 2023.

KMTC HIGHER NATIONAL DIPLOMAS EQUATED TO UNIVERSITY BACHELOR'S DEGREES



KMTC on October 28, 2022 received a certificate of registration and accreditation from the Kenya National Qualifications Authority (KNQA) following a successful evaluation and subsequent endorsement as a Qualification Awarding Institution (QAI).

Following the accreditation, the College's Higher National Diploma Qualifications now fall in the KNQA level 7 which makes them equivalent to the Bachelor's degree, Certified Public Accountant (CPA) III, Certified Public Secretary (CPS) or Master Craft Person I.

Presenting the Certificate, KNQA Ag. Council Chair CPA Rosemary Njogu lauded the College for the integral

role it continues to play in Kenya's health sector.

"We acknowledge and appreciate the impact that KMTC has had in safeguarding the health of millions of Kenyans and beyond our borders," she said. "Keeping in mind that the College's courses are designed to build critical medical skills while incorporating the effective use of modern technology, the accreditation

as a QAI will bear significance in Kenya's medical field and the African Health Sector by extension, she added".

KMTC Board Chairperson Amb. Zachary Muburi-Muita, in a speech read on his behalf by KMTC Board Director and Chair of the Academics, Standards and Ethics Committee Dr. Naomi Mutea,

observed that “The decision to register qualifications and learners with KNQA builds confidence in our programmes and has, therefore, opened new opportunities to attract as well as enroll more foreign students while positioning KMTC as the premier middle-level medical training college in Kenya and beyond.”

He added “It gives me pleasure to note that now our graduates are linked to training and career opportunities globally since their qualifications are aligned and verifiable to potential employers as well as higher education institutions.”

A total of 42 KMTC qualifications which were fully aligned to KNQF requirements for accreditation have been registered onto the Kenya National Qualifications Framework (KNQF) portal. A team of technical officers from both KNQA and KMTC are currently working towards ensuring the remaining qualifications are registered before the end of the year.

The College Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Dr. Kelly Oluoch said the College will continue to enhance its processes to ensure the quality of graduates KMTC releases into the market meet the expectations of employers as well as those they serve.

“This accreditation provides an assurance that our programmes are recognized worldwide and in return their comparability with qualifications of institutions of higher learning enhances employability of our graduates,” Dr. Oluoch added.



Towards ensuring the quality of the College’s processes, Dr. Oluoch said KMTC would continue to develop and implement sound strategies as well as leverage on technology. In addition, KMTC will continue to innovate to enhance excellence in its training programmes.

On his part, KNQA Ag. CEO Dr. Juma Mukhwana noted that to remain competitive in a dynamic world, the College would need to continually focus on enhancing accessibility of its training programmes. This he said can be achieved by strengthening quality to meet international standards and relevant applicability of skills in the labour market.

KMTC Deputy Director Academic Dr. Nyawira Mwangi said the College currently offers 93 courses, developed in line with local and international

health training needs as well as market forces.

The College has so far registered 57,268 graduates, who completed their training between 2016 and 2021, with KNQA. A further 15,922 students set to graduate on December 1st 2022 are earmarked for registration.

The event was attended by among others Education and Quality Assurance Council (ESQAC) chairperson, Dr. Chris Galgalo.

HEALTH CS LAUDS KMTC FOR TAKING TRAINING TO ANOTHER LEVEL

Health Cabinet Secretary Ms. Susan Nakhumicha has commended the Kenya Medical Training College for its quality training terming it as next level.

“I am particularly impressed by what I have witnessed at the skills laboratory and the simulation laboratory,” she said, speaking on her official visit to the College on November 14, 2022.

She challenged the Board and Management to expand roll out of the facilities to more KMTC Campuses to ensure students gain adequate practical experience before handling actual patients in the clinical placement sites.

Terming primary healthcare as the cornerstone to Universal Health Coverage, CS Wafula further lauded the College for being at the forefront in training this cadre of healthcare professionals. “I am pleased to note that the College offers, among others, a certificate course in Community Health Assistants,” she said adding “this cadre will be instrumental in supporting my ministry ease the pressure on referral hospitals.

Referencing Miss Lukresia Robai, the KMTC Nursing who has taken the internet by storm through her dancing and passion for service, the CS encouraged KMTC students to emulate her example noting “her passion and attitude has given a new face to



publicly trained healthcare professionals.”

The CS assured the College of her unlimited support to ensure continued delivery of quality training.

Concurring with the CS’s sentiment on the level of training at KMTC, acting Health Director General Dr. Patrick Amoth noted that it is impossible to talk about healthcare in Kenya without mentioning KMTC. “Thanks to the number of health professionals the College releases every year, the KMTC’s graduates account for about 80 percent of health manpower in our facilities,” he said.

Representing KMTC Board Chairperson Amb. Zachary Muburi-Muita, Board Director Mr. Fredrick Wamwaki speaking on the demand for KMTC courses reported that the College receives more than 30,000 applications. This, he said, has advised

the decision by the KMTC Board to expand the College’s geographical spread in the country to deal with shortage of health workers in the country, and support the Government’s Universal Health Coverage goals.

On the other hand, CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch noted that CS Wafula’s ascension to the office of the Health Cabinet Secretary is proof that no matter where a student starts in life, they can rise to the highest level.

He observed that being an alumna of the College, the CS would bring significant change to the health sector and propel even further, the quality of training at the College.

The CS undertook her diploma in Pharmacy at KMTC, graduating in 2000 before proceeding for further studies.

During an event organized by the Nation Media Group on September 11, 2022 to recognize the winners in this category, Dr. Oluoch was awarded a certificate, trophy, and the title Business Daily Top40Under40 Men Winner 2022.

Since he was appointed the CEO in March 2022, Dr. Oluoch has overseen the allocation of funds to Higher Education Loans Board

(HELB) to help KMTC students finance their education in addition to registration of the College on the Kenya National Qualifications Authority, equating KMTC's Higher National Diplomas to University Bachelor's Degree among other notable achievements.

According to the organizers, the Business Daily's Top 40 Under 40 list, is an annual selection of the most influential and progressive personalities who have left a mark in corporate Kenya and business.

In the list are entrepreneurs, artists, corporate high-fliers,

Kelly is a man of action and results. Under his leadership, KMTC has successfully negotiated with the Treasury and Parliamentary Committee on Health for students to receive Higher Education Loans Board funding to finance their studies.

Before this, needy students were dropping out of the school that operates 72 campuses in Kenya and hosts some 54,000 learners.

The student loan scheme has since received 10,000 new applicants, 6,740 of who are continuing students.

Dr Oluoch has steered the institution to get accreditation by the Kenya National Qualifications Authority so its courses are recognised locally and internationally, which works to assure potential employers.

As part of making KMTC a recognisable brand globally, he is spearheading the search for foreign mar-

kets for its trainees with the cohort of 19 students having the UK in June this year.

He also led a process to solve perennial challenges in devolving and accreditation of staff by the Nursing Council of Kenya as the regulatory authority.

Having joined the KMTC as a lecturer, the avid reader has through the ranks to be appointed CEO in April 2022. Before appointment, he had served same post in acting capacity August 2020.

Persistence, consistency being purpose driven are traits that have helped him stay focused on learning at the 40 mentors, some of who are men of the KMTC board.

Leadership, he believes is a collaboration rather than solo competition and requires continuous learning to be able to adapt survive in a dynamic environment

COLLECTIVE SIGH OF RELIEF AS KMTc AND HELB PARTNERSHIP BEARS FRUITS



KMTc students are a relieved lot following the good news that they will now be able to apply for Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) loans to enable them finance their education.

This comes after the official launch of the education financing scheme for KMTc students totaling to KShs. 680 million.

Speaking during the event held on October 26, 2022 at the KMTc Nursing Assembly Hall in Nairobi, KMTc Board Chairperson Amb. Zachary Muburi-Muita reported that following the inking of a partnership between the College and HELB, KMTc will hand over an initial KShs. 170 million, disbursed by the National

Treasury, to enable students start the application process immediately.

“It’s the Board’s resolve to continue providing prudent leadership so as to effectively mobilize and utilize resources to meet the College’s strategic objectives,” Amb. Muita said.

Thanking HELB for their invaluable support towards KMTc student’s financial aid, he added that “Let us keep seeking long-lasting solutions to ensure that none of our students are left behind for lack of finances to pursue their dreams at KMTc.”

The Chairperson observed that the money would go towards helping and empowering the most needy cases and that the ability to reach out to

the most vulnerable members of society was reason enough to take pride in the gains made so far towards the objective.

He encouraged students to take an initiative by engaging in legitimate jobs to supplement their finances. This, he said, will prepare them for the world out there.

KMTC CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch reported that the College in partnership with HELB has already developed a selection criteria to ensure the financial support goes to those it is intended for.

“We are all here today because someone believed in us and supported us in getting an education,” the CEO said challenging KMTC Principals and Heads of Department to take up an active role in resource mobilization to ensure sustainability.

Speaking at the same event, HELB CEO Mr. Charles Ringera noted that over the years, about 49,000 students have benefited from HELB loans. Of this, 13,187 accounts have matured for repayment with 2,500 students already having paid back in full and a further 7,000 in the process of repaying.

“The total amount repaid by KMTC students comes to Kshs. 205 million from an initial disbursement of Kshs. 3.5 billion shillings,” Mr. Ringera said emphasizing that sustainability of the fund was crucial to enabling more needy students access support to finance their education.

Reiterating Dr. Oluoch’s sentiments, Mr. Ringera encouraged Principals to actively participate in resource mobilization for the College as

they are in close proximity to respective Members of Parliament, County Governors and other partners.

In the partnership between the two entities, KMTC will, among others, provide financing for the scheme in addition to collaborating with HELB in joint resource mobilization activities.

On the other hand, HELB will receive and administer funds on behalf of the College in addition to, collaborating with KMTC, to set up the criteria and conditions governing the granting and disbursement of financial assistance among others.



KMTC STUDENTS SET TO GET MORE EDUCATION FUNDING FROM LEAP

The College Students are set to benefit from increased education funding thanks to a continued collaboration between the College and Lending for Education in Africa Partnership (LEAP).

This was announced when the KMTC Chief Executive Officer Dr. Kelly Oluoch hosted LEAP Director Ms. Gladys Mutisya at the KMTC headquarters, on November 9, 2022, to explore opportunities to strengthen partnership between the two institutions.

“The College will continue seeking longlasting solutions to ensure none of the students from needy backgrounds are disadvantaged due to lack of College fees,” he said. Adding “We thank LEAP for stepping in and bridging the gap to ensure students complete their training as scheduled.”

Speaking during the meeting, Ms. Mutisya said “KMTC is among the higher education institutions benefitting from the LEAP funding and we are keen to enhance our partnership”.

The College has been in collaboration with LEAP since August 2021, where so far, 48 students have benefitted with tuition and accommodation fee, as well as stipend. The College works closely with its Deans of Students to identify needy cases for consideration by LEAP.



LEAP is a non-profit initiative that provides affordable finance to youth from low and middle income backgrounds in East Africa pursuing higher education. Apart from financial support, LEAP with its consortium of partners prepares fellows for career readiness, financial literacy and linkages to the job market.

On October 26, 2022, the College in collaboration with HELB launched an education financing scheme for KMTC trainees aimed at assisting needy students to access and complete training without disruption.

Among those present in the meeting were LEAP’s Programme Officer Ms. Marsha Kasili, KMTC’s Registrar Academic Affairs Dr. Lucy Waweru, Corporate Communications Manager Ms. On-

"I have a passion for science and research, and the theme of this year's contest was one of my favorites," she says.

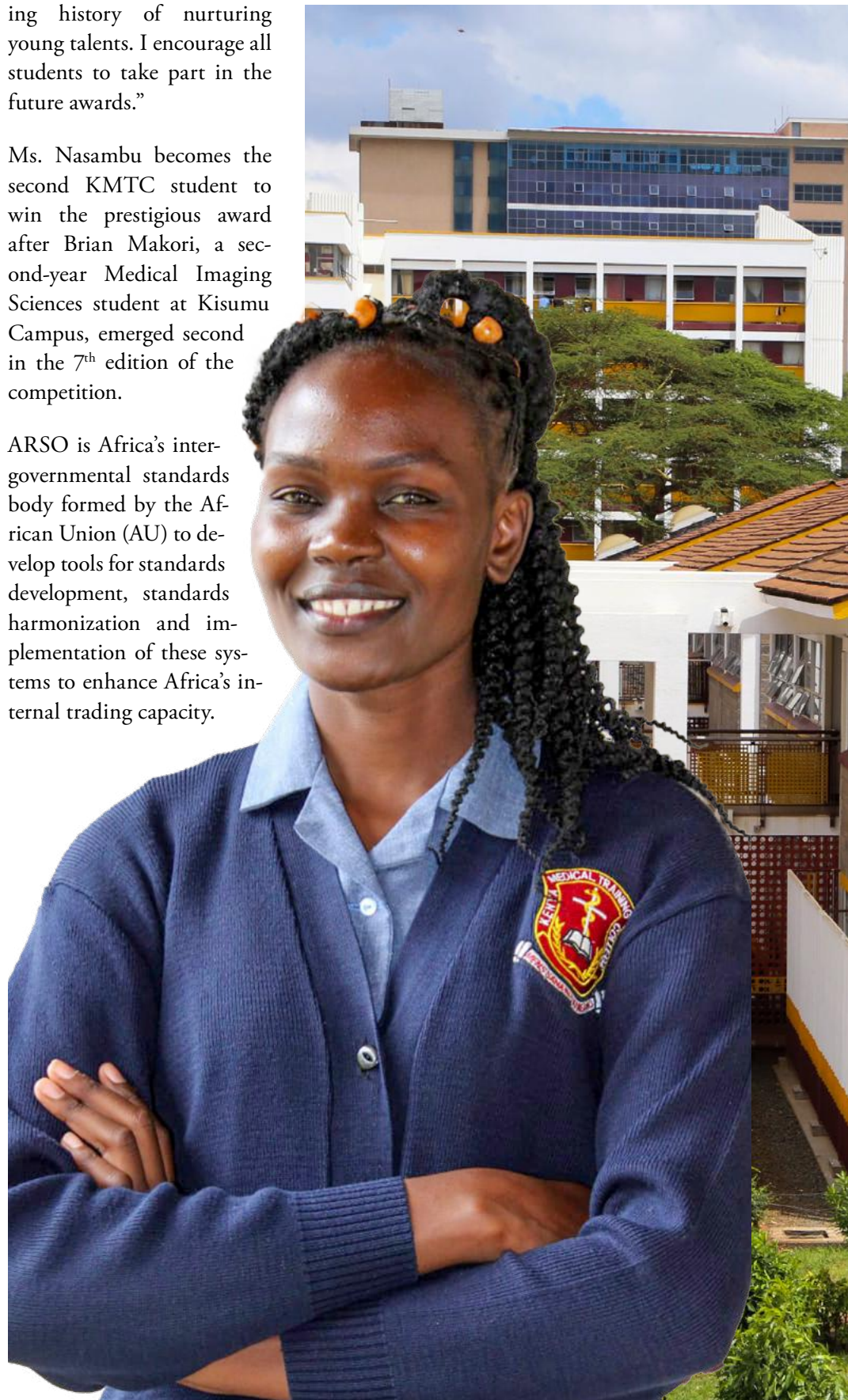
She credits the win to the support she received from her colleagues and lecturers.

Medical training is skills-oriented and as such, students spend 70% of their learning practices

KMTC CAMPUSES RECORD IMPRESSIVE EXAMINATION RESULTS AS NEW CURRICULA DEVELOPED AND CAPACITY BUILDING FOR FACULTY UNDERTAKEN

KMTC Campuses have continued to post impressive results in the Final Qualifying Examinations (FQEs) with 9,738 candidates having sat the June/July 2022 FQE. Of this number, 8,229 candidates passed giving an 84.5 pass rate.

In the category of Campuses offering the highest number of programmes, Nakuru Campus emerged as position one with a mean score of 68.24 percent while Nairobi came in second with an average score of 65.01.

Under the category of Campuses with five courses, Kabarnet Campus attained position one with an average pass rate of 68.06 percent, followed by Kisii Campus with 68.06 percent and Port Reitz with 67.61 percent.

Siaya Campus topped with a 67.67 percent pass rate in the category of Campuses offering four courses, while Bondo came in second with 67.60 percent followed by Manza in third position with 67.04 percent.

In the ranking of Campuses with three programmes, Makueni Campus emerged as position one with a cumulative mean of 70.79 percent, followed by Kaptumo with 69.69 percent in position two and Chwele in position three with 69.35 percent.

Kangundo posted an impressive record of a 100 percent pass rate attaining a cumulative mean score of 73.70, while Kuria and Nyahuru posted 72.53 percent and 68.79 respectively coming in at position two and three respectively in the ranking of Campuses offering two courses.

Shianda Annex, Mbooni, and Lamu Campuses came in at position one, two, and three respectively in the ranking of Campuses offering one course with 73.79, 72.71, and 71.94 percent.

On the other hand, the College undertook the development of Curriculum support tools for a higher diploma in Nutrition and dietetics and a training manual for Social Behavior Communication Change (SBCC) Model.

To build the capacity of faculty, a total of 15 Lecturers were trained on the basics of blended learning, eLearning Standard Operating Procedures (SoPs), and use of the KMTC Learning Management system (LMS) from 29th August - 2nd September 2022 in Kangundo Campus. Further, on the use of the KMTC Library Management System for continuous assessment ten lecturers were trained on 8th September 2022 in Nairobi Campus.

In addition, Principals, Deputy Principals, and Academic Heads of Department were sensitized on eLearning SOPs during a virtual forum held on 20th September 2022.

COLLEGE TO MOUNT NEW PHYSIOTHERAPY SPECIALIZATIONS

KMTC has announced the mounting of two new specialties in Physiotherapy to meet evolving market needs.

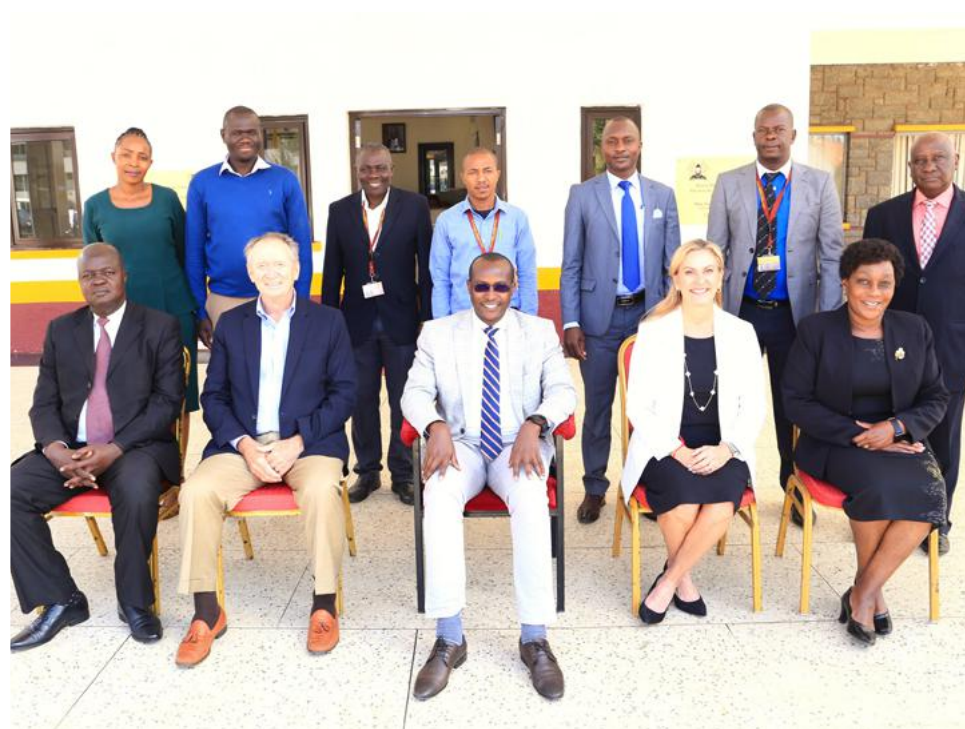
The Higher National Diplomas in Cardiopulmonary and Pediatrics, will be offered, beginning the March 2023 intake.

Cardiopulmonary entails physiotherapy treatment to patients affected by heart and lung diseases, while pediatrics neuro-rehabilitation deals with neurological and musculoskeletal diseases affecting children.

The courses are designed specifically for practicing Physiotherapists who already hold a basic training in Physiotherapy-related fields, and will allow them to upgrade their skills to tackle challenging assignments in the profession.

During a meeting held on September, 27, 2022 at the KMTC Headquarters in Nairobi, with Dr. Richard Jackson and Ms. Ann Jackson, of the Jackson Clinics USA, CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch assured that the College has invested heavily in infrastructure, curriculum development and global training resources to effectively blend teaching, learning and administration of its training programmes.

“We receive numerous requests from the working class, locally and internationally, who are desiring to upgrade their skills but need



to work full-time. We require more specialized training to meet the current demand in our hospitals,” he said.

“This training which takes 18 months is coming in handy to provide additional skills needed in our health facilities.”

The two courses will be offered in a hybrid mode, where trainees will attend online classes, after which they will be required to attend a face-to-face, one-week practical lab session and another week for mentorship and skills check.

The Jacksons have been in a long-running partnership with the College since 2012, and have been instrumental in advancing the training of Physiotherapists in the country.

Dr. Jackson stated that the world is now a global village and as such the partnership with KMTC will continue providing students with world class education standards to propel them to the international job market.

“We will continue supporting the College to mount more specialized courses, as this is the direction the world is taking in the practice of Physiotherapy,” Dr. Jackson said.

The new courses are in addition to three Higher National Diploma courses being offered by the College including Orthopaedic Manual Therapy, Neuro-rehabilitation, and Pelvic Floor Rehabilitation.

The College also offers a post-basic Diploma course in Physiotherapy.

COLLEGE EYES PARTNERSHIP WITH EDITH COWAN UNIVERSITY

The College has identified joint research and degree programmes, capacity building, student exchange and articulation agreements as possible areas of collaboration between the KMTC and Edith Cowan University (ECU), Australia, KMTC CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch has said.

The CEO was speaking during a meeting between the College Management and representatives from the University held on July 27th, 2022 at the KMTC Headquarters in Nairobi.

Dr. Oluoch underscored the importance of mutually beneficial partnerships in enhancing teaching and learning saying, “KMTC values collaborations in order to learn from others for continuous improvement and institutional growth.”

ECU Executive Dean, School of Nursing and Midwifery Dr. Karen Strickland said among the many schools the university has, is the school of nursing and midwifery with a population of 2,000 students, out of which International students account for 23 percent.

Appreciating this, Dr. Oluoch reported that a large majority of students at KMTC were enrolled in nursing diploma programmes with a significant number also enrolled for higher diploma programmes. He highlighted other programmes that offer



potential for collaboration such as Exercise Physiology, Addiction Studies, Occupational Health, Medical Engineering, Health Promotion and Public Health, Speech Therapy, Ageing Health Para-Medicine and Psychology.

On her part, Dr. Strickland reported that “The University offers placement opportunities to international students who graduate in their Nursing and midwifery programmes and also runs support programmes for international students to help them adapt, get well versed with the work environment and the technology in health care.”

She also identified research as a good starting point where-

by the two institutions would need to identify areas of interest and look into a five-year plan. She observed that collaborative webinars and sharing curricula to initiate an articulation programme (where students commence training locally and, in the third year of study, transition to ECU and are awarded a degree) was also a promising starting point.

As a way forward, a team from the two institutions will be constituted with a mandate to structure the collaboration by identifying areas of interest, look into a five-year plan and develop a Memorandum of Understanding to steer the collaboration.

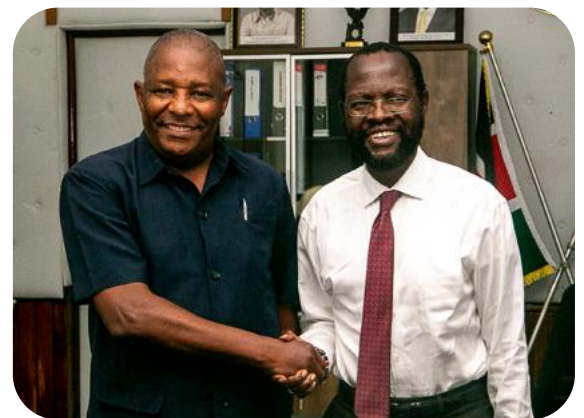

On emerging opportunities, Dr. Oluoch singled out transcription of medical prescriptions for Artificial Intelligence (AI). “We are currently in discussions with a few companies in USA to translate medical information for AI and are trying to pilot this with our Higher National Diploma students so we can export elements of our medical practice,” he added.

Further, on the area of medical education, Dr. Oluoch noted that the College is seeking for investors in technologies and commodities including high-fidelity mannequins that mimic human reactions,

and simulation laboratories to enable KMTC students acquire sufficient experience to handle patients safely.

He reported that the College is actively looking to grow its students’ population in addition to the courses it offers. This, he said, is geared towards ensuring that the country has a sufficient pool of competently trained health workers and a surplus is available for export. Moreover, this will be a foreign exchange earner for Kenya, he added.

In line with its mandate as the largest trainer of middle level health care workers, the College will this year release about 16,000 graduates into the health sector in the upcoming graduation, the highest ever in the College’s history.

KMTC TAKES LEAD IN COUNTRYWIDE BLOOD DONATION DRIVE



KMTC has partnered with the Ministry of Health and the Kenya Tissue and Transplant Authority (KTTA), in a countrywide blood donation drive themed “Kenyan by blood.”

Speaking during the national launch at the KMTC headquarters grounds on November 18, 2022, Health Cabinet Secretary (CS) Ms. Susan Nakhumicha, in a speech read on her behalf by Head of Health Services Dr. Zainabu Gura, reported that the Ministry intends to go beyond the minimum clinical need for blood to collect the optimum need, which is one million (1,000,000) units annually into perpetuity.

The CS noted that achieving this would require each Kenyan to consider blood donation an act of patriotism. “It requires that each eligible

Kenyan becomes a regular donor,” she added.

She further noted that “blood collections have risen by 250 percent over the last two years to their highest ever, being 348,507 units collected in the Financial Year 2021/2022. However, this is still 30 percent below our minimum need of 500,000 units annually.”

Towards supporting the initiative to encourage Kenyans to become regular blood donors, the CS reported that the Ministry would contribute up to Kshs. 800,000,000 million towards this campaign, by ensuring that each blood unit is safe for transfusion by testing for HIV, syphilis, hepatitis B, and C in addition to undertaking blood grouping.

“Inter-Ministerial partnerships, such as between the Kenya Tissue and Transplant Authority and the Kenya Medical Training College will be leveraged to ensure our joint strengths are optimized,” she added.

KMTC Board Chairperson Amb. Zachary Muburi Mui-ta stated the College will take advantage of its extensive Campus network to support the blood donation initiative, to ensure “this precious

life-giving commodity is available as and at where it is needed.”

“This partnership stands to accelerate Kenya as a hub for medical care for the region and with the potential of manufacturing blood derivative components which are essential for saving lives,” he further remarked.

The Chairperson revealed that the health manpower oversee-

ing the safe drawing, screening, and storage of blood in the six regional blood banks in the country are all products of the College. “KMTC, therefore, continues to demonstrate, through its graduates practicing in the health sector, the quality of training offered in the College,” he added.



On his part, KMTC CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch divulged that up to 75% of the health care cadres trained in the College, work in environments where surgeries, trauma cases, blood disorders, Obstetrics emergencies, complications of pregnancies among other clinical conditions that demand blood transfusion.

In addition, he said KMTC Nairobi is home to a Center of Excellence in phlebotomy. “With this in mind, we sought to establish this partnership to foster the creation of awareness and advocacy among Kenyan youths by building a blood donation culture,” he said.

Dr. Oluoch reported that Managers of blood donor services are trained at KMTC and the College would be graduating 84 Diplomas in Medical Laboratory Sciences in addition to 19 Higher Diplomas with specializations in Blood Transfusion Science, Haematology, Histopathology, Microbiology, and Clinical Chemistry.

KTТА Chairperson Dr. Janet Kabeberi, represented by Board Director Mr. Alfred Obengo, speaking on her organization’s mandate of ensuring access to the safe and ethical use of hu-

man tissues and organs, encouraged Kenyans to support the initiative to collect 500,000 units of blood annually.

On the other hand, KTТА acting CEO Dr. Nduku Kilonzo conveyed her gratitude to the College for welcoming and supporting the partnership, towards saving lives.

First daughter Ms. Charlene Ruto, the Kenyan by-blood champion, called upon Kenyans to come out in large numbers and donate blood that would go towards helping those in dire need of it.

The event was attended by among others representatives of the Red Cross, the Rotary Club of Kenya, and the Boda Boda Association.

The Kenyan by blood campaign seeks to leverage the patriotic nature of the Kenyan youth to develop a blood donation culture to ensure there is sufficient safe blood for every Kenyan. The countrywide blood drive will go on for the next six months and all are encouraged to donate.

KMTC staff are a happy lot following an assurance by the College Chief Executive Dr. Kelly Oluoch that the arrears accruing from the 2014-2018 Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA) will be paid with their July salaries.

“It is envisaged that with this incentive to staff, productivity levels will increase, and service delivery enhanced towards achieving the College’s core mandate,” Dr. Oluoch said, speaking during a meeting held to sensitize Shop Stewards from the various KMTC Campuses from 20th to 22nd July, 2022 in Kisumu.

Emphasizing on adherence of staff to labor practices at the workplace, the CEO urged the Shop Stewards to ensure that staff in the respective Campuses are aware of and comply to the provisions of the KMTC code of conduct on staff discipline, the Public Officers Ethics Act 2003 as well as Chapter six and the bill of rights as contained in the Constitution of Kenya (2010).

The KMTC Management and KUDHEI-HA Workers Union signed a four year CBA for the period of 1st July 2014 to 30th June 2018 with a basic salary increment to be within a limit of eight percent for the unionisable employees for the period of the CBA implemented at two percent each year in addition to the annual increment.

New Members Elected to Represent Staff in the Retirement Benefit Scheme



KMTC staff have elected two members for appointment by the Board to represent them in the College Staff Retirement Benefit and Staff Pension schemes, respectively.

This follows the expiry of the first term for Mr. Dossantos Kalungu, representing staff in the Defined Contribution Scheme (DCS) and second term for Mr. Hillary Rotich, representing staff in the Defined Benefits Scheme (DBS).

Resulting from the election held on December 7, 2022 in Nakuru, Ms. Susan Kabugi from the KMTC Headquarters and Mr. Dossantos Kalungu from KMTC Mbooni Campus have been elected by delegates to represent staff in the DBS and DCS respectively.

Following announcement of the winners, the two could not hide their excitement as they pledged to bring their collective talents to the scheme to support in its further growth and development.

Board Trustee Dr. Leah Bii commended the 76 delegates who represented staff in the exercise for electing a woman and enabling the scheme meet the two thirds gender representation. “We look forward to harnessing their energy and new ideas to take the scheme even

further,” she said.

Trust Secretary and acting Human Resource Manager Ms. Lilian Kemboi congratulated the two winners while pledging her support as they undertake their new roles.

On his part, Minet’s Mr. Robert Rotich informed Ms. Kabugi, who will be beginning her first term, that she would be undergoing induction training to familiarize her with the scheme’s operations, after which she would be expected to join one of the sub-committees to support the scheme’s mandate.

The College runs two staff pension schemes, the DBS and the DCS. In the DCS scheme member’ and employer’ contributions are both invested on behalf of each scheme member and the proceeds used to buy a pension and/or other benefits at retirement. The retirement benefits for each member depend on how much money has been saved up by the time of the member’s retirement date.

On the other hand, in the DBS a fixed pre-established benefits for employees at retirement is paid out. Benefits are often related to the final salary and/or years of service of the employee.

KMTC UNDERTAKES STAFF CAPACITY BUILDING



KMTC has undertaken staff various training for staff across different cadres in its ongoing efforts to build staff capacity and empower them to perform optimally.

In this regard, the College conducted a sensitization workshop on bribery/corruption risk assessment for supervisors in the various divisions from 21st to 23rd September 2022 at KMTC Nakuru. This was aimed at equipping the target group with skills and knowledge on corruption risk assessment and the development of mitigation plans.

On the development of productivity indices and measurement and improvement of the same, the College organized a weeklong training session from 7th to 11th November 2022 at a hotel in Nakuru. The training, whose target group was the technical working committee, was facilitated by a team from the Salaries and Remuneration

Commission (SRC) and the Ministry of Labor.

For Supply Chain Officers, the College sought to sharpen their skills through a Public Procurement Information Portal (PIIP) training facilitated by officers from the Public Procurement Regulatory Authority. The training that took place from 14th to 18th November, 2022 at Nakuru Campus, saw the participants taken through an overview of PIIP, the amendments done in 2022, an understanding of the Standard Tender Document (STDs), contract management, PIP- procurement planning and risks in public procurement.

In addition, from 13th to 16th December 2022, at Nakuru Campus, KMTC National Values and Principles of Governance Champions underwent refresher training on national values and principles of governance.



Further, the College's Corporate Communications Officers benefited from a week-long training at the Kenya School of Government, Embu from 31st October to 4th November 2022. The team was taken through key topics such as fundamentals of written communication, editing techniques, the process of speech writing, protocol, etiquette, and events management as well as office correspondence etiquette and protocol.

The College undertakes regular capacity-building training for staff across all cadres to support the development of skills and knowledge necessary to improve their job performance, improve organizational effectiveness as well as become more adaptable to changing ways of doing things and keep abreast of new developments in their respective industries.

from Vihiga Campus was first appointed to KMTc on 26/11/2018 as Driver III, a position he held until his demise on 18/9/2022.



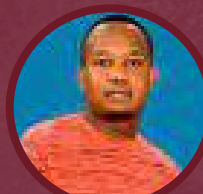
